Young Deaf Activities (YDA) is focused on young people of all ages who are deaf and deafblind* who live or enjoy activities in Buckinghamshire.

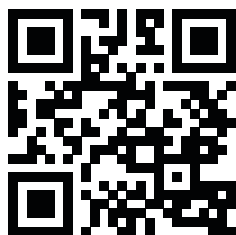
Our aim is to bring young deaf and deafblind* members together to have fun by arranging Saturday Youth Clubs, monthly Parent Support Groups, holiday events and other activities. We also offer families with deaf and deafblind* children British Sign Language Lessons and communication support within the home. Our organisers, staff and volunteers are either D/deaf** themselves or have considerable experience with the deaf community.

YDA has been established since 1994 and was registered as a charity in 2001.

***D/deaf: When the word 'deaf' is written with a lowercase d, it usually refers to the audiological experience of deafness. This means someone who is not able to hear as well as someone with normal hearing. The National Deaf Children's Society uses the word 'deaf' to refer to any level of hearing loss.*

When the word 'Deaf' is written with a capital D, it refers to the cultural experience of deafness. When someone identifies as Deaf, they identify as a member of the Deaf community and share a sense of Deaf culture with other members of the Deaf community. Most people who identify as Deaf use sign language.

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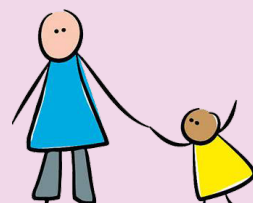

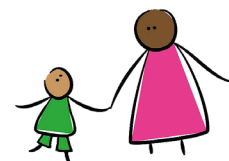

Home Communication Club (HCC) offers families with deaf and deafblind* children **British Sign Language Lessons and communication support** within the home.



Curriculum covered is family based to meet the needs of your child. HCC are flexible with what is taught, we meet at a time that suits you and the sessions are not limited to immediate family members only. We would love to see Nanny, Grandad, neighbours and whoever plays an important part in your child's life involved in the lessons. HCC provides 10 initial one hour free sessions. Further sessions can be requested, however a donation may be asked depending on your situation.

A Deaf Role Model

Deafinitely Youth Theatre

What did it mean to you personally to take on your first role as a deaf Associate Director?

It has been an amazing journey for me. I love this role because, since I was young, I have always envisioned myself as a director. When I studied Creative Media at Berkshire College of Agriculture (BCA), I really enjoyed directing film projects alongside hearing students, and I also supported a BSL interpreter.

I found the role fascinating and wanted to learn more about theatre directing. Fortunately, Deafinitely Theatre offered me a placement as an actor, and I trained with them from 2019 to 2024. During that time, I wanted to broaden my skills beyond acting, and I was lucky to be given the opportunity to work with Paula as my Head Director. I find the role very interesting and quite different from directing in film or TV, as well as from being an actor.

What challenges did you face as a first-time deaf Associate Director?

At first, I tried to control everything on stage. However, Paula reminded me that my role was to step back, observe, and make notes rather than lead directly. I like being in control, but I had to learn to take a step back. That's how I develop my skills — by observing and then discussing ideas with the director. This is how the Associate Director role works, and it has helped me grow.

Do you see yourself becoming a director, or do you want to continue acting as well?

That's a good question! I want to do both. I've had many acting opportunities since studying at BCA, but there are fewer opportunities for Associate Directors or Directors. However, I will keep pursuing both paths and see where they take me.

I have three qualifications with distinction in Creative Media, including directing, and I don't want to waste the hard work I've put in — it deserves to be used.

How did you help the cast build confidence in their performances?

The cast was already fantastic — natural performers with amazing skills. They were also lucky to have me as a Deaf Associate Director, which helped ease communication barriers, created a more comfortable environment, and ensured they no longer felt awkward.

What advice would you give to other deaf young people who want to work in theatre?

Don't ignore small opportunities. Whether it's fringe theatre, non-profit organisations, background roles, or small film projects — take them. Those opportunities can lead to bigger ones in the future.

For example, I took on the role of DYT Assistant at a summer school in Amersham — should I have said no to this opportunity? No way! It would have been a terrible and wrong decision. It turned out to be a very positive and valuable experience. I loved this role, and it made me eager for even more opportunities like it.



TV Role: Lord Allison in Bridgerton

What attracted you to this role?

I never expected to be part of Bridgerton. When I was invited to a self-tape audition, I didn't even realise it was for the show at first as they used a secret code which is Vauxhall. When I was offered the role of Lord Allison, a deaf character, I was really excited. As a deaf and BSL user working in a hearing acting world, this felt like a huge opportunity.

There were many well-known actors on set, and I worked closely with Kitty, who played my wife. She is hard of hearing and can sign, which made communication much easier — especially since my BSL interpreter couldn't be present during filming, she was a great support.

How did you prepare for the role?

I made sure to read the full script of the episode in which I appeared in advance, so I could understand the entire story, even if my role was small.

Bridgerton is set in the 1800s, so I had to consider how BSL might have been different at that time. That was a challenge. I worked with a BSL consultant, and together we decided on appropriate signing choices, including fingerspelling "NERVE."

There was a lot of preparation — costume fittings, makeup, call sheets — but it was all worth it in the end.

What was the most difficult scene to prepare for?

One of the hardest challenges was not wearing my hearing aid, as it didn't exist in the 1800s. Without it, I couldn't hear anything and had to rely entirely on visual cues, which was hard work and required me to use my eyes constantly.

The team supported me by giving me a clear visual cue: I had to watch for actors crossing a line on the floor, which signalled when it was my turn to speak. Again, Kitty was very helpful in keeping me aware of what was happening around me.

What did you learn from playing this character?

I learned that BSL grammar and structure were very different in the past compared to today.

I also had to adapt my physicality — standing straight, moving formally — and the costume really helped me embody Lord Allison's character.

How did this role help you grow as an actor?

After *Bridgerton*, I received a lot of positive feedback both online and in person. It encourages me to continue acting and aim higher. I'm also very interested in translation work between British Sign Language and English, and I want to develop that skill further.

I auditioned for *Pride and Prejudice* for Netflix but wasn't cast. I really appreciated their attitude, as they still wanted to see my performance. However, I'm determined to keep pursuing new opportunities.

Will we see you in more TV shows?

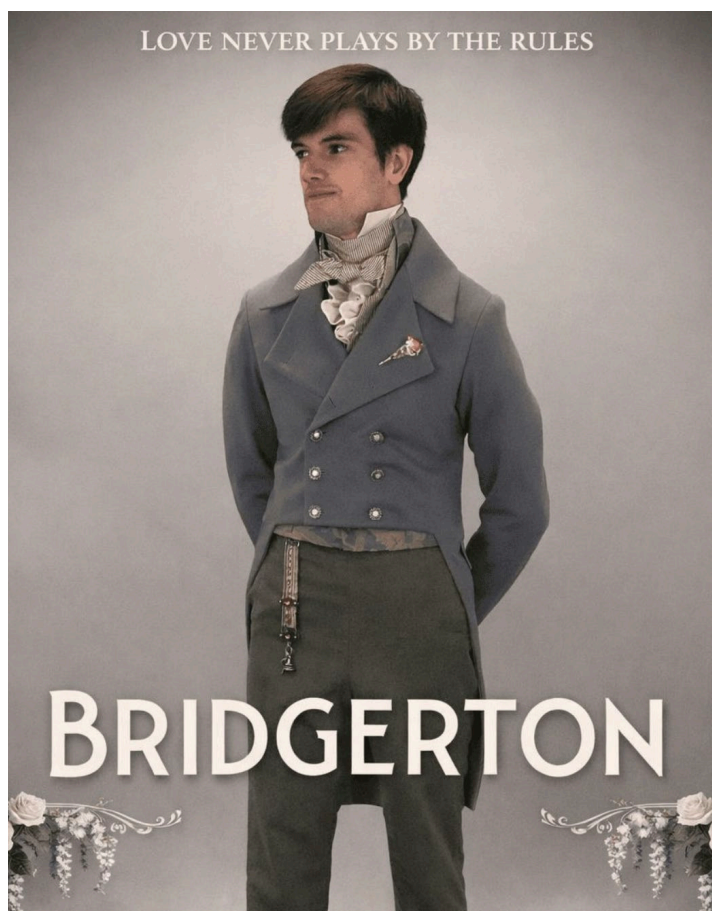
Yes — there are a few exciting projects coming up, though some are under NDA (Non-Disclosure Agreement). I can share that there's a theatre project in London near Victoria, a UK commercial TV project for Macmillan Cancer Support called "Fair Cancer Care," and potentially more work with Deafinitely Theatre. Watch this space!

How did you get your role in *Bridgerton*?

I had an agent from my time at BCA. A casting director, Kelly Hendry Valentine, found me through my profile. Interestingly, they didn't mention *Bridgerton* at first — it was a secret code for them. I had to quickly prepare a short performance for the role of Lord Allison with very little preparation time. Luckily, it paid off, and I got the role.

How does your role in *The Chelsea Detective* compare to *Bridgerton*?

In *The Chelsea Detective*, I played Jake Green, a character who worked behind a pub and as a mudlark. I had to research what a "mudlark" was and develop a deep understanding of the role. For *Bridgerton*, although my part was smaller, I researched what life was like for deaf people before sign language was banned in the 1880s, which gave me greater insight into the character. *The Chelsea Detective* gave me more on-screen experience and helped build my confidence. Without that experience, I believe I would have felt much more nervous on *Bridgerton*.

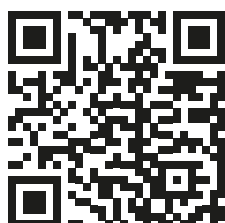
You are eligible for a CEA Card if you receive one of the following:

- Sight Impaired Registration (formerly Partially Sighted)

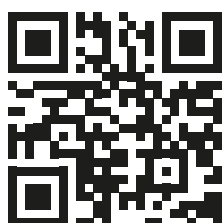
The CEA Card is available to applicants aged 8 years and above.

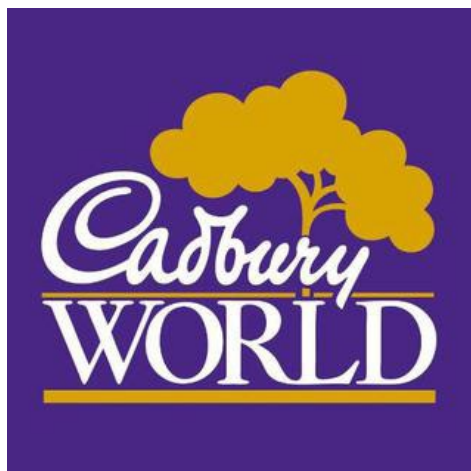

Laser Tag Wendover - Thursday 13th August 2026

Family Fund

In February, the NDCS launched a partnership with Family Fund to deliver a nationwide grants programme to support families raising deaf children aged 0 to 11, or who are still in primary school. This funding is about giving families choice and flexibility to try different approaches, create language-rich environment at home, and remove some of the financial barriers that can stand in the way of early language development.

Families were able to apply for funding to help pay for items that support their deaf child's communication and development, such as:

- **assistive technology related to deafness or hearing loss**
- **standard technology, such as tablets or similar devices**
- **support for learning British Sign Language, including course fees or related costs**

We received and approved funding for 775 grant applications. Closer to home, it was wonderful to see a family from Buckinghamshire among those successful applicants. After completing 10 weeks of family signing sessions through Home Communications Club, the parent will now go on to begin a Level 1 BSL course locally, funded through the grant. This next step will enable her to build on the skills she has already developed, giving her greater confidence and a wider range of signs to support communication with her daughter at home.

Peppa Pig

We're excited to share a fantastic new partnership with Hasbro, the creators of Peppa Pig, which is helping to raise awareness of childhood hearing loss in a truly meaningful and accessible way.

As part of this collaboration, new episodes feature George Pig attending an audiology appointment, where he is diagnosed with a unilateral hearing loss. These storylines provide a valuable opportunity to support families by helping them to recognise early signs of hearing loss, better understand deafness, and know where to turn for support. For younger children, seeing a familiar and much-loved character experience hearing loss offers powerful representation. It helps normalise difference, encourages conversations within families, and ensures deaf children can see themselves reflected in the world around them.

Alongside this awareness-raising work, the partnership has already made a remarkable impact through fundraising. In a memorable and creative moment, Daddy Pig took on the London Marathon, raising an incredible £57,000 to support deaf children and their families.

Our aim is to build this into a regular opportunity, with support available at the library most Saturdays. We would love to see families and friends attend regularly, helping to develop their BSL skills and confidence over time.

SEND Reform

Two new articles have been written on the NDCS website exploring the Government's proposed Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND) reforms and what they could mean for deaf children and their families.

The first article looks at proposed changes to SEND support, including new Individual Support Plans, Specialist Provision Packages and Inclusion Bases, while outlining some of the concerns around accountability and legal protections for families. The second article explores the Government's plans for increasing inclusion in mainstream schools, the proposed timelines for reform, and what these changes could mean in practice for deaf children. What are the proposals for increasing school inclusion and when will things change? | National Deaf Children's Society

Both articles provide an overview of the proposals, key areas of concern, and where we believe further action and clarity from Government is needed - including protecting specialist provision and increasing the number of qualified Teachers of the Deaf.

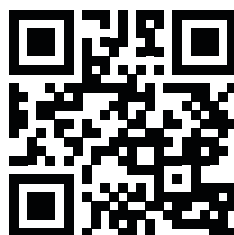
